Factory Facts

- Largest building in the world by volume (Guinness Book of World Records)— 114 feet, 2 inches (35 meters) tall and covers 98.3 acres (39.8 hectares)
- Disneyland could fit inside. So could 911 NBA basketball courts, 75 NFL football fields, 2,142 average-sized homes, or 3.32 billion 16-ounce (0.47 liter) soda cans
- Originally built in 1968 for the 747, expanded more than 45% in 1980 for the 767 and by another 50% in 1993 for the 777
- Four of the doors are 300 feet by 81 feet (91 m x 25 m) and two are 350 feet by 81 feet (107 m x 25 m)
- It took 10 painters five weeks to paint the exterior with 6,580 gallons of paint
- If stood up end-to-end, the graphics on the doors would stand 1,900 feet tall

Airplane Facts

- There are 940 747s in service today. 747s have flown 3.5 billion people (more than half the world's population) and logged more than 35 billion statute miles (56 billion km), enough for 74,000 trips to the moon and back
- At any given moment, there are 100,000 people in the air in a 747
- Boeing recently launched the new 747-8 Intercontinental, the “shape of the future”
- There are 835 767s in service today. 767s have carried more than 2 billion passengers
- Launched in 1990, there are 535 777's in service today, including the 777-200, 777-200ER, 777-300, 777-300ER, and the 777 Freighter
- The 777-200LR Worldliner recently set a world record for the longest commercial flight, flying 12,173 nautical miles (22,544 km) in 22 hours, 42 minutes from Hong Kong to London over North America
- The Boeing 787 Dreamliner has had the most successful program launch in Boeing's history. With 385 orders from 28 customers worldwide, the airplane is scheduled to enter commercial service in 2008.
