The Santa Susana Field Laboratory is a former federal government rocket engine testing and energy research facility in Southern California. The site sits in the middle of a critical wildlife linkage connecting inland Sierra Madre Mountains to the Santa Monica Mountains to the Pacific Coast. It is home to endangered plant species and abundant wildlife; deer, bobcats, coyotes, cougars and raptors roam wild.

Pacific Ocean

A number of organizations are involved in on-site biological studies; the San Fernando Valley Audubon Society performs bird banding and owl surveys, the Southwestern Herpetologist Society studies reptiles and amphibians and the Pollinator Partnership researches pollinator populations.

As a result of high-technology testing and research, chemicals seeped into the soil and groundwater. Boeing is committed to a comprehensive and protective cleanup that protects the ecosystem and preserves the site as open space for future generations.


